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From the chair

This is the third of the new format RMS Annual Report and Accounts and covers the year 2009. It brings together a summary of the activities of, and highlights the work undertaken by, the members of the Executive Committee (Exec), its subcommittees, the Regional and Special Interest Groups as well as providing an annual summary of the Society's financial situation.

All Officers of the RMS act voluntarily and all RMS work is done in their spare time or in work's time at the discretion of their employers and so the work that these people put in really deserves our thanks. I'd like to thank the current Exec and also Paul Dodgson, Keith Gregory, Robin Smith, Lucy Burrow and Heather Jack, all of whom stood down from the Exec in April 2009.

Indeed the last year has seen a great deal of change on the Executive Committee with all but one post changing hands and seven new people joining the Exec. In a relatively short space of time and at the same time as picking up the reins and managing new portfolios, we have subtly changed the way in which the Exec works. By reducing the frequency of meetings to quarterly, one of which is at Conference, and coupling this with regular conference calls, we have been able to enhance the effective operation of the Exec whilst at the same time reducing expenditure on meetings.

Moving along, it is certainly my view that the RMS should seek to serve the wishes of its members. With this in mind, it was refreshing and uplifting to see such a great deal of positive discussion regarding the future of the Society on the RM JISCMail list last September. It was also gratifying to see how many share the vision held by both myself and the Exec. This is not entirely surprising I suppose: having personally chaired the HE and FE Group and being supported

on the Exec by David Bridge, former Chair of WERIM/RMS Wales, Edith Pringault-Adam, former Chair of RMS Scotland and Elizabeth Barber, current Chair of the RMS Public Sector Group (Local Government Group as was), I

Financially speaking, 2009 was a difficult year. The change to start all subscriptions from January 2010 meant no subscription income came in during the second half of the year. This resulted in expenditure exceeding income for this period. When combined with the impact on the credit crunch, this meant that all but essential spending had to be curtailed. Better cashflow, more buoyant income and reviews of our major cost centres in 2010 should, all things being equal, leave us financially better placed, in the coming years.

This will enable us again to be both more representative and able to adapt in the ever changing Information World. It has been a very interesting year as Vice Chair. I have been kept busy supporting the fantastic work undertaken by my colleagues on the Executive and in the Regional and Special Interest Groups wherever I was able and (usually) when asked.

One of the major roles as Vice Chair is to fill in for Matt in his absence, and to fill the gaps that fall between other Directors responsibilities. For example, I have been developing deeper roots within our Regional and SIG Groups so that we all have a better understanding of our roles and how we support our needs in the profession. I have worked with Stuart Martinson of Wales to develop a new business CPD meeting format which has been well received by both the RMS Wales and the Midlands Groups. I have helped to establish the first (but not the last) "Meet the Executive" Regional Meeting in Shrewsbury and I have been able to simplify the administration of individual Groups by developing a set of framework documents, reports, agenda and constitutions.

In addition, I have also been developing closer links between the RMS, students and academic institutions. This work is ongoing and is not just limited to the traditional Archive & Records Management schools. I have helped to create a "new professional" RMS award category which is being sponsored by the Genuine Group, and I am delighted to report that the quality of the 2010 entries is exceptional.

My first year in this role has been great fun, and the adventures of 3 men in a mazda (Matt, Meic and myself) travelling to and from RMS events are sure to achieve legendary status. I would like to thank both the Exec, Benchmark and my colleagues in the Regional and SIG Groups for their support and for encouraging me to have another go next year!

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Executive Committee

In 2009 the RMS managed to maintain its position in terms of financial security, however, it is likely that we will be called upon to use some of our reserves to support the 2010 conference. As I write this report we are making financial provision to ensure that the conference goes ahead. The optimism from the 2009 annual report remains but the RMS, like many small societies, is tightening its belt to weather the continued economic crisis in the UK and throughout the world. 2010 could be frugal but I believe we will survive because we have taken a number of steps over the past few years to ensure we have cash reserves to see us through.

Review

The act of balancing the books and keeping enough money in reserve to pay for all the 'bills' in 2009 and 2010 is not an easy one. The RMS has a turnover of between £250,000 and £300,000 per year, about the size of a micro business. This year (and before our annual accounts were verified by our accountants) we spent in the region of £336,000 around £30,000 more than we took in. This is not a financial disaster and the £30K negative balance relates to the changes to the subscription payment system. The effect of introducing a sliding scale payment to realign all the payments to 1 January has had the effect of reducing the subscription revenue in 2009 by about £30K. This will be recovered by 2011 when everyone pays their full annual subscription on 1 January.

Sponsorship is not easy to come by at this time and we cannot assume that we will be supported by our sponsors to the same amount of money as in the past. We may find also that membership is affected as organisations reduce overheads and put a 'freeze' on staff membership to professional organisations such as ours. As a result the Executive Treasurer has to be sure that there is enough money in our cash reserves to cover all our bills for 2010 and the deposits for a conference in 2011. At time of writing our cash reserves were in the region of £144,000. £50K of that we are bound by the bank to keep in reserve to cover the use of the credit card facility. That leaves us £94K, a tidy sum you might think but it only just covers our 2009 overheads with £10K to spare. Over and above that our bulletin cost us £64K this year and the revenue from the bulletin was around £20K including advertising and mailshots. Our subscriptions revenue is in the region of £100K and this is the revenue that will keep us afloat in 2010.

The Executive will have some hard financial decisions to make in 2010 and we may see a delay to projects. What is certain is that we will need to review overheads and bulletin and website costs as well as looking hard at how much we can invest in a 2011 conference.

Subscription Fees annual payment date

The new annual payment date for subscriptions has begun and a number of you will have already received an invoice based on the new system to align all invoices with the beginning of the RMS

financial year i.e. 1st of January. This new system will reduce the administration associated with invoicing on every day of the year and bring in the fees as a lump sum which will facilitate cashflow. As with all small organisations cashflow is one of the most important items that a Treasurer or financial officer has to be in control of. Efficient cashflow allows bills to be paid on time, investment to be made in projects and a general feeling of good financial management when the 'books' are in the black.

Membership Packs

The new membership packs have been introduced and the Marketing Director has now taken responsibility for the continuing development and improvement of the content to support our members. These packs now include much more information about the society for both new and previous members as well as a membership card. There is a different pack for new members, renewing members and a pack for marketing purposes.

Charitable Donations

The committee has decided to continue our support of the International Records Management Trust. During 2010 they are being offered free space in the RMS bulletin to promote their work.

RMS Insurances

Professional Indemnity (PI) insurance for the RMS the new Local Government Classification and Retention Scheme is being finalised.

Budget in 2010

In 2010 we are not scheduled to undertake any new projects but hope to continue to support the upgrade to the website, and the introduction of the accreditation scheme. Marketing is under review at the moment and a budget will be agreed once this marketing programme is established. Budget support to the regional and special interest groups will continue as sponsorship declines due to the current economic climate. Contra deals with other organisations and attendance at exhibitions and conferences to raise our profile and, hopefully, membership numbers, is still on the agenda and will incur minimal expenditure as our volunteer committee members lend their support and attendance at these events. Joint ventures with other professional organisations will also assist us to remain secure.

It is worth repeating the following from the 2008 annual report – *The work of our committees, all members being volunteers, incurs few costs with many people not claiming expenses for travelling etc, however, the administration of the work we do is on the increase and the Executive is still hopeful that in the near future we will be able to employ a part-time non-executive secretary to support and co-ordinate a number of tasks that both the Executive Committee and groups are required to complete.*

We extended the Benchmark contract in June 2009 to include the position of meeting's secretary in order to take, write up and distribute the minutes (excluding those that pertain to Benchmark's

contract review or areas where Benchmark may wish to tender for additional work) within a specified time limit. This has improved the completion time frame for agenda items.

And finally

This is my last report as Executive Treasurer. I have been in this post since 2004. In six years there have been many administrative changes in order to make the finances of the RMS more secure and compliant. The role of Treasurer extends beyond money matters and into those of data protection; insurance; risk, contracts and tendering; and, compliance. Transparency in all things that we do as a Society is important and this transparency is apparent now within the financial areas of the RMS. May I wish the next

Executive Treasurer all the very best in the role, it is demanding and stimulating.

I should like to thank both Woodside Secretarial Services who supported me from 2004 to 2007 and Benchmark who have been supporting me since

2008 and say that it has been a pleasure working with all of you. I should like also to say that Clotilde Wang, Paul Duller and Matt Stephenson have been three energetic and supportive Chairmen to work with giving me chance to introduce new procedures and upgrade old ones. They never complained when I said NO to their financial requests.

Over the last three years members have engaged with the committee in a more active way than in any years since the beginning, in 1983, and I thank all of the members who have supported me in my post as Treasurer and most particularly those who have questioned decisions and protocol to enable the committee to ensure that we are abiding by the constitution. As I enter my 27th year as a member I look forward to the Society's future with excitement and a confidence that positive changes are afoot.

Executive Secretary's report

When I stepped down as RMS Chair in April, rather than simply accept the honorary position of Previous Past Chair, I took over the role of Executive Secretary. This has enabled me to continue to support the activities of the RMS, albeit in a more 'back-office' role, supporting both the RMS Executive and the RMS Secretariat (Benchmark Communications). We have seen a number of administrative changes under Matt Stephenson's leadership. For example, our bimonthly Executive meetings have moved to a quarterly basis (supported by interim monthly teleconferences) and minutes of our meetings are now published on the RMS website.

While much of the 'back-office' work undertaken by the Secretariat tends to go un-noticed (particularly when all is going well) it is worth noting that Benchmark Communications provide first line support for all telephone calls and enquiries (including over 450 requests for access to the LGCRS), mailshots, adverts and website advertising. Second line support is provided by myself and other members of the Executive.

The Secretariat work closely with the Conference Director to organise the annual conference, exhibition stands and sponsorships. They have also been working hard to improve business processes, "new look" branding and supporting documentation for membership applications, member packs, payments, renewals and invoices.

Despite a small number of cancellations, both individual and corporate membership numbers have risen steadily during the year (see Table 1 above). Our membership numbers of 1176 (include 357 corporate members) are expected to pass the 1200 barrier in early 2010. International

membership continues to increase and encompasses over 20 different countries including: Australia; Barbados; Botswana;

British Virgin Islands; Canada; China; Ghana; Ireland; Israel; Jamaica; New Zealand; Nigeria; South Africa; Sri Lanka; St Lucia; Thailand; Trinidad & Tobago; United Arab Emirates and USA.

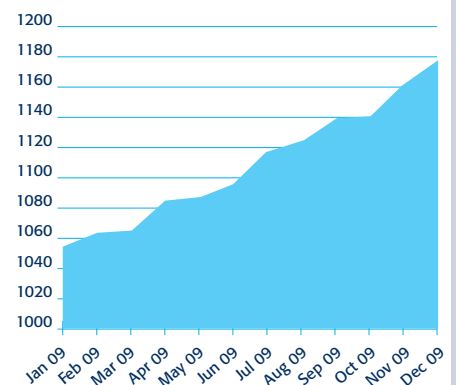

This has been a year of both steady progress and laying good foundations for the future. Main areas of activity have been, as always the bulletin and the website but there has been innovation with the creation of the New Professional's Award and development of various new partnerships and initiatives.

The Bulletin celebrated its 150th edition this year with a special issue. Also, initiatives have been introduced to diversify the content of the Bulletin. These will include the publication of entries for the New Professionals' award (see below) as well as a series of articles relating to the work of the IRMT (see below).

A website sub-committee has been established to oversee the long-due site revamp. Membership comprises the Editorial and Marketing Directors, RMS members James Lappin and Leanne Bridges and Gray Straughan from our web services provider. As a first step, a membership consultation process was completed. Since September, the process has been paused pending the discussion of RMS future direction. As part of this, we will be looking at how the website can be best utilised. Once this is completed, the sub-committee can then work towards planning the new site. Meantime, content

has been revised and updated and new features introduced.

An exciting development is the New Professionals' award. This has been initiated, developed and introduced this year. Sponsored by the Genuine Group,

the inaugural competition has already proven a great success. Entries are to be published in the Bulletin.

In addition, a number of new partnerships and collaborations have been introduced. Prominent amongst these is a greater collaboration and support for the International Records Management Trust. This will see advertising and article space made available in the bulletin as well as a link from our website. This is viewed as an effective way to support the valuable work of this body in the current cash-tight climate.

A couple of new initiatives are also worthy of mention. The first is the

development of an e-mail drop advertising scheme which will be piloted in 2010 and the second is the development of online voting which will also take place this year.

Between September and December 2009, a working party was convened to look at the future direction of the Society and produced a discussion document on this topic. This was circulated at the December meeting of the Executive and continues to inform discussion, the outcome of which will be discussed with the membership at large in 2010.

My year as editorial director has, I believe, been productive. It has certainly been interesting. In addition to the Executive team, I have enjoyed working with the following: Joanne Leonard and Carol Selby at Benchmark Communications, bulletin editor Jamie Burton at Tribal, production editors (our own) Paul Duller at Tribal together with Roy Webb at Hargraves and our web guru Gary Straughan at Brainbox. Much of the credit for the bulletin and the website in truth lies with them. Thank you.

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both trial the process and forms, and qualify to become accredited members of the RMS (AMRMS). The process has involved cries of woe such as "where oh where was that really appropriate piece of evidence I filed away..." alternating with "I wish I'd asked for that in writing..." – and that's just my experience anyhow! So the advice I continue to give at this point is two-fold: brush up your CV and evidence, evidence, evidence; make sure you contact people to give you feedback on IRM work you have done.

Meanwhile, some of the team's applications are currently with the three verifiers – Dr Julie McLeod, Zoe Smyth and Stuart Orr – who are kindly undertaking the first assessments. The aim is to launch details on the website ready for Conference, so watch this space....

With regard to enquiries, there has been a steady stream of training queries this year from both members and non-members. Most requests are for details about finding information, records, archive (and even one IT)

university courses; some were looking for one-day events such as those advertised on the RMS 'events' internet page; and there is a growing demand for longer courses of a week to 10 days. Whilst there is plenty to recommend in the first two categories, there appears to be a gap in the market for the latter type, so please let us know if you have done or offer any week-long IRM courses, so we can advertise them on our website!

Conference Director's report

The 2010 Conference has proven to be quite a challenge!

The date had been set well in advance for March 2010, a full month earlier than usual. The untimely resignation of Heather Jack, Conference Director, at the end of 2009 Conference meant that the preparations did not get under way until July 2009 when I took the helm of the Conference ship. Calls for speakers were completed in October and from then on it was a race against time to complete all the necessary

stages of the successful event. This is the opportunity to thank everyone who has provided assistance and support during the 9 month period of intense work from all involved, and Benchmark staff in particular.

Edinburgh 2008 raised the bar and Brighton 2009 kept it high. The feedback from both events were overwhelmingly positive, with some learning points raised and still room for improvement in some areas. Brighton 2009 produced a positive balance sheet and the goal this year is once again to break-even. However recession hit all sectors of the economy and be it records management or conference organisation tough decisions had to be made against difficult budgetary constraints. In terms of delegates, the dizzy heights of Edinburgh 2008 where 350 people attended were not reached in 2009 in Brighton (304). This year the economic downturn

forces more conservative expectations but we are planning for more than 270 delegates to attend.

Feedback from Brighton has been taken into account in the organisation of this year's conference. The general format has been retained in 2010 but with some key changes: a state of the art conference venue combined with a choice of 3 hotels to suit everyone's budget, sessions specifically reserved for case studies presented by the persons directly involved in the projects, on the second day only one keynote speaker at a later time and two debates on key issues, a broadening of the profession reflected in the topics discussed, "lighter" and more personal sessions in the last hour of the second day. We await your feedback with anticipation!

Whether or not to hold a conference in 2010 has been debated at Executive meetings. As dates had been announced to the members and

elements of the conference had started to be organised, it was decided to proceed. So what about 2011? The debate still rages on! Conference is one of the key deliverable objectives for RMS, it has become a staple date in the information's professional calendar and a year without one would certainly raise a few eyebrows and questions.

Organising a national conference is no mean feat. It requires time, patience and ability to deal with stressful situations. This is a challenge for the new Conference Director, Rob Hutton, who is interested in your views on the matter.

Since its formation in 2006, the RMS Ireland Group has been committed to providing a forum where all involved in records management in the region can share ideas, experience and best practice. Despite the difficult economic climate, attendance at RMS Ireland Group meetings remained high during 2009.

'Records Management: Past, present and future' was the theme chosen for the RMS Ireland Group's first meeting of the year. Approximately 50 delegates attended this event in Cork on 28 May 2009, kindly hosted by Cork County Council and generously sponsored by Active Navigation. Well-tailored and practical presentations were delivered by a range of speakers from different sectors, including Tom Quinlan, National Archives of Ireland, and Michele Noad, Wiltshire County Council.

The RMS Ireland Group continued to work in close partnership with the Society of Archivists, Ireland. A very successful joint training seminar for members of both societies, sponsored by Hewlett-Packard, was held in the National Library of Ireland, Dublin, on 12 November 2009. The topic explored was 'Ensuring the Integrity of Electronic Records'.
